Pastor Chris's Message

As I've been driving around the valley I have been noticing how overcome with emotion I am at seeing our green hills and mountains, at watching how the clouds creep over in night and retreat in the morning like the hand of some giant, and at noticing how many diverse shapes and shades of gray the clouds take on. I can't help but feel something profoundly spiritual going on as I'm immersed in such beautiful creation. The word that keeps coming to my mind is connected. This is always one of my favorite times of year in the valley because nature sings with beauty. April is also the time we celebrate

Earth Day and it also happens to be the day of our Hike for Hunger. As we venture closer to these awesome events, I want to share, in better words than I can muster, words from Franciscan Monk and Contemplative Priest, Richard Rohr, on how creation mirrors God back to us. As you read, please take the time to find your own spiritual connection to God as you encounter creation this month.

Long ago, St. Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179), named a Doctor of the Church in 2012, communicated creation spirituality through music, art, poetry, medicine, gardening, and reflections on nature. She wrote in her famous book, *Scivias*:

You understand so little of what is around you because you do not use what is within you. [1]

This is key to understanding Hildegard and is very similar to Teresa of Ávila's understanding of the soul. Without using the word, Hildegard recognized that the human person is a *microcosm* with a natural affinity for or resonance with its *macrocosm*, which many call God. Our little world reflects the big world. The key word here is *resonance*. Contemplative prayer allows your mind to resonate with what is visible and right in front of you. Contemplation erases the separateness between the seer and the seen.

Hildegard often used the word *viriditas*, the greening of things from within, similar to what we now call photosynthesis. She recognized a readiness in plants to receive the sun and to transform it into energy and life. She also saw an inherent connection between the physical world and the divine Presence. This connection translates into energy that is the soul and seed of everything, an inner voice calling you to "Become who you are; become all that you are." This is our "life wish" or what Carl Jung called the "whole-making spirit."


Hildegard is a wonderful example of someone who lives safely inside an entire cosmology, a universe where the inner shows itself in the outer, and the outer reflects the inner,

where the individual reflects the cosmos, and the cosmos reflects the individual. Hildegard said, "O Holy Spirit, you are the mighty way in which every thing that is in the heavens, on the earth, and under the earth, is penetrated with connectedness, penetrated with relatedness." It is truly a Trinitarian universe, with all things whirling toward one another: from orbits, to gravity, to ecosystems, to sexuality.

In another place, Hildegard has God saying: I have created mirrors in which I consider all the wonders of my originality which will never cease.

Indeed, for Hildegard nature was a mirror for the soul and for God. This mirroring changes how we see and experience reality. Later, Bonaventure (1217-1274) wrote: "In the soul's journey to God we must present to ourselves *the whole material world* as the first mirror through which we may pass over to the Supreme [Artisan]." The Dominican Meister Eckhart (1260-1327) said the same: "If humankind could have known God without the world, God would never have created the world."

Nature is not a mere scenic backdrop so humans can take over the stage. Creation is in fact a full participant in human transformation, since the outer world is absolutely needed to mirror the true inner world. There are not just two sacraments, or even seven; the whole world is a sacrament!

The funds are not intended to be used for budgetary expenses or operating costs of the church.

Donations to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund are always welcome and needed. All donations to the Pastor's Fund are kept confidential and the distribution of the fund monies is also confidential. This money is not a part of the church's general budget and is used, as its name states, at the pastor's discretion.

In addition to this month's Noisy Offering, at any time if you would like to donate to this fund, make your check out to Bethania as usual, and note in the "memo" line that it is for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. This fund is intended to help people who express an urgent, confidential need, and access to these funds allows our pastor to respond promptly with emergency aid and counseling.

Church Business

Council Highlights - March 15, 2018

The church entry light has been repaired and is working beautifully.

Council considered a recommendation from the Christian Ed. Committee about partnering with the County Foodbank to distribute food in the Solvang area. The main focus would be the "Blessing Box" that Council approved a year ago but has not been enacted for lack of an active Property Committee, which we now have. There is also the possibility that food could be provided for the preschool children's snacks. Storage of food and actual distribution procedures are things that need to be addressed. Council decided to move forward with application process with the understanding that the Foodbank would need to inspect the storage and distribution facilities and offer recommendation and help address concerns. This will not be a soup kitchen kind of distribution as that would directly conflict with the preschool.

Council is planning of having a small "retreat" the Saturday of April 28 to concentrate on long range goals for Bethania and formulate an updated mission statement.

Treasurer's Report February 2018

Balance Sheet:

- The balance sheet has been adjusted to include the earnings from 2018 for the Endowment Fund, Heritage Fund, and Cemetery Fund. The results are an increase of over \$210,000 in the church's assets. This is significant, as we have effectively reached our goal of \$1,000,000 in the endowment fund (if you include the Heritage Fund in that amount). Praise God for His faithful people who believe in endowing Bethania's future.
- The cash position is in excess of \$10,000 after paying our bills in February, a marked improvement from the last three months.
- The money market fund reflects a balance of \$91,724.
- There are no long term debts, and all liabilities are current with the usual exception of the pension liability of \$2,200.

Profit & Loss Budget Performance:

Income:

- The most significant change in the P & L budget performance statement is the separation of fundraising as its own line item. We have removed it from the Miscellaneous Income line item to better reflect our efforts in fundraising. We have also included a line item for fundraising expenses to clearly identify all income and expenses for our fundraising.
- The fundraising line item reflects \$4,808 as income compared to \$1,250 budgeted. This is all income from the Fastelaven event.
- Other income is down by \$1,799 primarily due to lack of facility use income for the month of February.
- Offerings are up (praise God!) by \$3,625. Both member and non-member offerings were above budget for the month and up by \$2,627 for the first two months.
- Other receipts were up by \$500 for the month.
- Total income for the month was up by \$6,690 and income for the first two months was up by \$9,820.

Expenses:

- Benevolence giving was up by \$305 due to increased offerings and some designated benevolence given by members.
- Salary and benefits were below budget at 93% for the first two months.
- Office administration expenses were below budget for the month, and were at 80% of budget for the first two months.
- Property expenses were under budget by \$732 for the month and were at 84% of budget for the first two months.
- Utilities were up for the month by \$472 largely due to increased gas and electricity usage.

- All other accounts were at or below budget for the month and for the first two months.
- Total expenses for the month were below budget by \$2,673. For the first two months expenses were below budget by \$1,298.

Overall: The first two months of the year showed great improvement over the last three months of 2017. Offerings were up, the Fastelavn event was a huge success, both in program and financially, and our expenses are well controlled. Thanks be to God for His blessings and for our faithful members and staff. Bethania is living its mission and ministry and showing God's love in our community.

Reaching Beyond Bethania - Nancy Emerson

Some Bethanians have said to me, "I feel like I am being asked by Bethania all the time to donate to its charitable projects," while others say, "There are lots of ways I can help meet people's needs at Bethania and I can pick and choose among them." Given these different ways of looking at Bethania's efforts to respond to Jesus' teachings, what is the "rhyme and reason" in the ways we reach out to others in need?

First, we need to understand that, unlike some churches, this work primarily happens outside the church's Operating Fund. The Operating Fund provides the staff and facilities necessary for both in-reach and outreach. It does include a percentage of our offerings sent to the Southwest California ELCA Synod, which it shares with the national ELCA Synod. These contributions help make possible their work on our behalf with the poor in Southern California and around the world.

So how are we able, working together, to share and exponentially expand our individual love and concern for others?

Disaster Relief and Sustainable Development: Lutheran World Relief (LWR), ELCA Hunger Fund and ELCA appeals for specific disasters are known in national and international humanitarian circles for getting funds to persons in need, going in early and staying to help rebuild after many other agencies have left. In addition to disaster relief, their funds are used wisely and directly for ongoing agricultural and other sustainable development projects in developing countries.

Bethania supports these organization through the LWR Quilts project, LWR Personal and School Kit projects, the Hike for Hunger and the Produce Table. These projects build on Bethania's earlier Social Ministry work, which focused on hunger.

Education: Locally, our Endowment Fund* provides annual college scholarships for the church's students and Preschool staff. Contributions to the Preschool and After School's Tuition Assistance Fund through Christmas Greetings, Tribute Gifts, Thrivent Choice and grants enable lower income children from working families to attend its programs.

Internationally, BLCW has sponsored scholarships for girls and women since 2003. For 9 years, it supported a Tanzanian student at the Maasai Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS) and then Sokoine University where she and another MGLSS student were the first women to obtain a degree in rural development. Beginning in 2012, BLCW has sponsored scholarships at the model program in a village in India, Piyali Learning Center, developed by the local PACE International. We are entering our 7th year of sponsoring two girls, who are now 11 years old. Since its 18 months literacy and vocational program began, we have sponsored scholarships for 2-3 young mothers each year.

Other Local Projects: The Produce Table provides some of its funds to the local Salvation Army for its voucher project with the Sheriff's Office for emergency food and shelter needs as well as other local efforts to help families in need. We contribute items and Noisy Fund offerings to St. Vincent de Paul's Circle V Ranch summer camps for low income children. This

year the Endowment Fund* contributed to the Boy Scouts and Circle V Ranch to help rebuild after the Whittier Fire (\$2,000 each) and made a \$5,000 donation to another local non-profit - Santa Ynez Valley Cottage Hospital's Foundation - reasoning that everyone needs the hospital.

Since its inception, we have supported the ongoing work of Iglesia Luterana Santa Cruz through the Operating Fund and, more recently, the Endowment Fund. Because its families are low income and have food insufficiency, especially during the winter months, we continually collect food and other necessities for them. Our Christmas Angels project provides Christmas gifts (clothes, shoes, toys) to its families' children and teenagers. We provide Christmas gifts for Preschool & After School families who need a helping hand. We did a Foodbank project in the past with Thrivent.

Noisy Sunday Offerings: This project, brought to us from Alaska by the Mees, enables all worship attendees to help others, whether or not they can work on charitable projects themselves. The causes span local through international human needs.

As we do this work together, we remember Jesus words, "As you do this for the least of us, you do it for me."

*Our Constitution designates at least a minimum of 10% of the Endowment Fund's income annually for outreach beyond Bethania Lutheran Church.
