Pastor Chris's Message



I've recently embarked on a new book that has me engrossed unlike any book I've read for a while, called *Lost Connections* by Johann Hari. The purpose of the book is a comprehensive exploration of the causes and treatments of anxiety and depression in our culture. He details the history of anti-depressants as treatment and then goes on to explore nine categories he's identified that cause depression and anxiety, which he calls "disconnections". Some of these categories are disconnection from nature, disconnection from purpose, disconnection from a community, etc.

With each chapter he shares the scientific research behind each disconnection by psychologists, MDs, anthropologists, sociologists, etc., as a way to highlight that behind depression and anxiety are the stories of each person's background. His point is rather than treat depression and anxiety as a problem of brain chemistry, we should look at what's happening in a person's life and understand the overall evolutions of human society that might be contributing to this, such as people spending more time in their house, hooked into media, working at jobs without secure futures, etc.

My point in all this, and the place I come from when reading this book, is to understand how spirituality and philosophy play a role in both contributing to the problem of increased depression and anxiety in our culture, as well as their potential responses to it. For example, the holy writings of our faith come from the Bible, and all of those writings come from a time when culture was entirely communal. The people who were hearing those words for the first time understood them from a communal perspective because that's all they knew. Yet, today our faith is understood far more from an individualistic perspective. Salvation is individual, our relationship with God is personal, and we are more and more distanced from the people we seek to help because our lives don't necessarily cross paths.

As Hari highlights these various disconnections, his response is to create these connections again (in a much more detailed way). What triggers me in reading his book is how many of these connections parallel our faith. When Jesus said the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand, he was pointing people away from the Temple orientation to experiencing God in the world around. When Jesus healed lepers, people with disabilities, women who were bleeding, the blind, people with mental illnesses, etc., he was reconnecting them to their communities. When Jesus spoke love to the gentile woman, the woman to be stoned, the Syrophenician woman, Zacchaeus the tax collector, and all the other outcasts, he was reconnecting them to their identity as beloved children of God. When he was speaking blessings to the poor, the meek, the hungry, the merciful, the peacemakers, and the persecuted, he was reconnecting them to their inherent worth.

What I'm getting at is that new information in psychology, sociology, anthropology and medical science is pointing to what faith and philosophy have been saying for a long time: as humans we are wired to be in community with one another, to care for one another, to seek love with each other and with the world around us, and when we live in these states of being, we are healthy people and we are healthy communities, and we were severed from these streams we fall into anxiety and de-

pression. Not only is our society, with its focus on wealth, consumerism, and individuality not addressing these issues, but no longer is our faith because it has become a product of the society it seeks to serve.

However, as Hari seeks to make these connections again, our faith is just as present making the same call. The call to love, the call to create peace, the call to lift up, the call to include, the call to identify people as worthy, the call to care for this planet, simply put, the call to be Christ in the world. Will you listen?

More About our Piyali Learning Center Scholarships

As of Jan. 21, you have donated \$175 toward our goal of \$1,275 to provide scholarships for girls and young women at Piyali Learning Center.

We just learned that Rekha Mistry, who is now 13, continues in the School but Reshma has been replaced by Papiya Singh as our second scholarship recipient. We are following-up on Reshma. A couple of our young women Literacy-Vocational Training students have completed their program but Rama Naskar continues in the program. She is newly joined by Tumpa Mondal and Kalidasi Parbat. Photos and letters will be on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall through February.

Since 2012 when we began providing scholarships for this school, we have talked about PACE Universal and Piyali Learning Center. PACE Universal is the non-profit U.S. organization formed by Solvang resident, Deepa Willingham, to develop comprehensive educational programs for girls and young women and Piyali Learning Center is its initial program. It is located in the 30,000 person “village” of Piyali in a rural area near Mumbai, Indian. It is not only improving female educational opportunities but strengthening the entire village.

We have made it very easy to invest in these students' future this year. You may write a check to Bethania Lutheran Church. On memo line: “Piyali Scholarships.” The church will then write a check to BLCW transferring these funds so BLCW can send them to PACE Universal.

Noisy Sunday: Helping Support Our Troops Offering taken during morning worship on Feb. 24th

On the fourth Wednesday of each month, Santa Ynez Valley We Support the Troops Inc. prepares approximately 100 “care packages” for American service members stationed in countries such as Iraq, Afghanistan, Syria and South Korea. They pack these boxes right here in our Parish Hall and ship them overseas.

The recipients are usually but not always connected to someone from the Santa Ynez Valley, whether it's a relative, friend or co-worker. Troop members send letters requesting things such as jerky, wet wipes, shampoo and body wash, batteries, and sanitary items for women. (The current list of requested items is available at their website <http://www.we-support-the-troops.org>) Anyone can ask for a care package to be sent to a service member stationed overseas by contacting the group.

Since 2004, “We Support the Troops” has been providing the care packages at no cost to our men and women in military service. This all-volunteer effort is charged with soliciting the generous donations of supporters, purchasing the necessary goods desired, packaging and mailing to our Troops. These simple items lift the spirit of our Troops, make life easier and instill hope of a safe and early return to a normal life here at home. Each box sent includes a personal letter. SYV We Support the Troops have been supporting the families of our deployed men and women here at home at no cost to the recipients - with 100% of the donated funds being used to support this effort.

Donations from our Feb. 24th Noisy Offering will help purchase items as donations for SYV We Support the Troops. In addition, Bethania will be hosting another Valley-wide Collection Day for SYV We Support the Troops on Saturday, March 23rd from 9 am - Noon in the Parish Hall.

We all really “make change for the better” with the Noisy Sunday! So bring your coins and make some noise on Feb. 24. Together, we can CHANGE a soldier's world with a box of donated items, gratefully sent from all of us here at home.

Next Generation of Drivers for Meals on Wheels

Bethania Lutheran Church has been one of seven Valley churches providing drivers for Meals on Wheels, which delivers meals prepared by Atterdag Village to seniors “living in place” in their own homes and to persons where surgery or other health problems make it difficult to do their own cooking. This Meals on Wheels has three routes. We do either Route 1 – Solvang & east to Refugio Road or Route 2 – Ballard, Los Olivos & Santa Ynez.

For more than fifteen years, Agnes Larsen has coordinated the Bethania members who drive to deliver meals on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday once every seven or eight weeks. We celebrate her faithful, cheerful service as BLCW reluctantly accepts her request to be relieved of this responsibility.

Emily Abello has agreed to coordinate our Meals on Wheel team and is looking for a Co-coordinator when her husband and she are traveling. So, who will help Emily?

Also, we need a younger generation of drivers. Over the years, there has been a group of twelve or more volunteer drivers. Some have now reached an age where it is not possible to continue. Spotlight: Buellton Senior Center/SYV Meals on Wheels

At the January Social Ministry meeting, special guests Pam Gnekow and Linda Linton came to discuss challenges for the upcoming year for the many programs at the **Buellton Senior Center**. Recently the BSC discovered they there would be a \$75,000 shortfall in grant funds this year, due to re-direction of grant monies because of recent fires and flooding. In addition, with the government shut-down, many of the people who are served will be affected by shortfalls in the Cal Fresh/Food Stamp program.

The average income of people served by the **Meals on Wheels program is \$868.00 per month**, Linda Linton explained. When the seniors pay their monthly rent (usually \$550 at the mobile home park), that doesn't leave much to live on. Currently the Meals on Wheels lunch program provides 136 meals to seniors 5 days a week. Additionally the other programs, such as third Wednesday "mandate dinner" (which also serves migrant families and the homeless), "no waste" programs, and other senior help are facing funding cuts. They also provide rides to medical appointments around the county. In addition, they pass out bags of food from FoodBank on Mondays to those in need.

The **Brown Bag Breakfast program** has been reduced to serving only those with immediate need (see related article on our own packing day to help, Feb. 17th). Staff members have all had their days reduced at least one paid day per week. Volunteers help carry the load, as do some homeless who help with small jobs at the center. The program is running very tight, trying to think of how to conserve and still provide services.


Donate items for the Brown Bag Senior Breakfasts – Bethania's upcoming packing day will be on Feb. 17th

Message from the Church Council

The Council held its first meeting for the new-year at 7:00 pm on Jan. 17, 2019.

During this meeting, new officers of the Council were elected as follows:

Council members received a report from Property Committee Chairman, Don Thompson, on all the tasks Property Committee has already undertaken and a view of potential future projects. One specific project is the drainage issue from the toilet located off the kitchen in the social hall which tends to be constantly plugged. Don advised that there are several options being pursued, and priced out, but that the immediate solution is to place this rest room “temporarily out of order” until a permanent repair can be achieved.

Each year Council members volunteer for Liaison positions to each Congregational Committee for the coming year. Each of our committees is assigned a Council Liaison person to attend the committee meetings and report back to the Council as to the activities of that committee. The Committees keep the Liaison “in the loop” by inviting them to attend all meetings and by providing them copies of the minutes of each committee meeting. Treasurer's Report

December 2018 Financial Statement

Balance Sheet:

The cash position in the general checking account was \$16,203. This is a significant improvement over previous months, and a very significant increase over Dec. 2017 when the general checking was -\$2000. The increase was due to the increase in December offerings.

The money market fund was down by \$10,000 to \$86,874 for the month. This drop reflects the movement of funds from the fund to general checking over the last two months. It should be noted, however, that the combined cash balance was nearly \$16,000 over the month of November's balance, and nearly \$5,000 over October's cash balance.

All liabilities have been paid for the month, and the church has no indebtedness. The usual pension liability of \$2,387 remains the only liability.

The combined assets of Bethania are \$3,725,942.

Profit & Loss Budget Performance:

Income:

Other income for the month was up by over \$11,000, largely due to moving of funds from the money market fund (previously not recorded as income) to the P & L.

Offerings for the month were up by \$10,875 over budget (\$36,851 compared to \$25,977 budget) For the year, offerings were \$229,225 compared to a budget of \$216,200, or a \$13,025 increase. Praise God for our generous members and visitors!

Overall income for the month was \$23,024 over the projected budget and total income for the year 2018 was \$51,296 over the projected income for the year.

The one soft spot in the income budget was the facility rentals, which were \$3,000 below the projected budget, and were less than last year's actuals.

Expenses:

Benevolence support was up by \$9,000, however most all of that was from special offerings and benevolence gifts that were earmarked for local disaster relief. Our core benevolence giving was nearly 5% over budget (due to increased offerings).

Salary and benefits were under budget for the month by \$1,585 and were on budget for the year at 99.5% of budget.

Staff expenses were under budget for the month and were at 86% of budget for the year.

Office administration expenses were under budget for the month and were at 98% for the year.

Property expenses were slightly under budget for the month but were at 102% of budget for the year – largely due to our aging facilities.

Utilities were over budget for the month by \$612, but were right on budget for the year at 100%

Christian education was over budget for the year due to VBS expenses, but those were covered by increased income from VBS.

Outreach committee expenses were over budget due to the printing of new brochures for the church – a supply that will last us into the new year.

Worship and music was over budget due to unexpected expenses in repairing the organ.

Overall our expenses were at 108% of budget. However, our income was 118% of budget. We had a net revenue over expenses for the 2018 year of \$20,862. Praise God from whom all blessings flow! And thanks be to God for Bethania's faithful members who supported the mission and ministry of our congregation

What has the Property Committee Been Doing?

Here is some insight into Bethania's property committee activities. In 2018, the sanctuary received a new sewer line, as well as new Air Conditioning system. Refinishing work on the pews is well under way and will be completed this year. We are also currently working on upgrading to an LED compatible dimmer switch and LED bulbs. Future improvements to the Sanctuary include upgrading the front doors followed by replacing the pew cushions. There has also been some improvements for the Preschool; The bathroom flooring was replaced inside the classroom, a toilet was repaired, a broken cabinet door, broken fence boards, loose bricks on the playground, heater filters replaced, light bulbs, etc.

The sewer line servicing the Parish Hall is having a lot of problems. The line runs from the Parish Hall connecting with the preschool and flows to the street on Atterdag. At least the section between the parking lot fence running to the parish hall is in need of replacement in the near future and we are working on a cost estimate.

We are planning a "Work Day" on March 30th and are hoping to do a lot of exterior painting projects, and an array of small maintenance items. Hopefully we can get a couple volunteer painting crews to tackle the exterior of the church office, and the doors and trim on the preschool. There is also some TLC needed with the window cranks in the parish hall, window cleaning, and other tasks. We are a community of Christ-centered, welcoming, inclusive and multi-generational people rooted in God's faith, hope and love, called to advocate for justice, give to those in need, and share God's affirming love with the world.

The LRPC intends this to be an interactive exercise between the committee, the council and the congregation. It will involve multiple interactions with the congregation including surveys, interviews and questionnaires. Please expect the first of these surveys soon.

We anticipate that this will take considerable time to do well. We ask for your participation, your patience, and your cooperation to help us reach conclusions based on the overall desire of our congregation.
