Pastor Chris's Message



I've shared it enough times that most of you know I stopped going to church as a kid and came back to it as an adult. I'm not sure if I shared with you my experience at church that continued to have a profound effect on me, but I'd love to now!

When I started going back to church it was an 11am contemporary service with a small worship band and about 20 – 30 regular churchgoers. I didn't particularly like the music. It wasn't the musicians – they were great and dedicated – it was more the theology behind it, which seemed shallow and superficial. I would often go to the bathroom during the music and wait until it was over before returning to the sanctuary.

I share this because a lot of folks expect the music to be the thing that brings them in and keeps them going, or, is what keeps them from coming back (I've received these comments as a pastor), but the music didn't have either of those effects on me. At first, it was the pastor. He had a laidback, casual way of preaching that was immediately disarming and his sermons were so relatable that at times I thought the sermon was specifically for me. And he was expressing the same theology we affirm at Bethania, but at that point, it was a novel theology for me.

As I came back every Sunday I began to notice that it wasn't simply the sermons that kept me returning. In fact, I discovered the parts of Sunday worship I was missing the most was the space before the service formally started and the space after the service formally ended. This was the space where I would walk in and encounter a group of people who knew me, were delighted to see me, knew what was going on in life and would regularly check in about those things – and vice versa. I looked forward to this communal space every Sunday and was excited to see people who knew me and loved me authentically.

This was all taking place at the age of 22 and like many 22 year olds I was still in the throws of experiencing legal drinking. I was usually out with friends on Friday and Saturday night at some bar or restaurant having a fun, but safe time. Every Saturday night I would cut my time a little short and make sure I was home to get some sleep because of church the next morning. And when friends would try to make plans on Sunday I would always tell them it would have to be after noon when church got out. I was surprised, but looking back delighted at my priorities at this age.

What's more, my friends never looked at this as though I was drifting away from them and moving towards this new lifestyle, but could see that both having fun with them and going to church every Sunday fit together. They didn't know it, but it was because we have a theology of grace, a theology that takes us as we are and doesn't try to mold us into individual moralists, but rather helps us connect with our identity as beloved children of God and uses that to help others.

This went on for about a year. I worked, went to school, had fun on the weekends and went to church every Sunday. The routine was good and my faith life was a pinnacle in my daily living. My friends never questioned whether my church life was superficial and I never tried to evangelize them (still not

something I'm keen on). And then something incredible happened. Some of them started asking if they could come to church with me sometime. Whether it was adverse experiences that had hit their own lives or simple curiosity of what would keep me going to church so regularly, there was something they had detected that compelled them to want to check it out.

They haven't become regular church attenders and that's not really important to me that they would have, but they've followed my story from then, through seminary, to now. They regularly comment that this story has shaped their understanding of what God could be rather than the stories they've heard that tell them what God is. They've opened up to the idea that they don't have to change to encounter God, but rather God seeks to encounter us in love and often that leads to change.

My reason for telling this part of my story is that it has shaped my outlook on ministry today. Likewise we, as the Church, are called to encounter God in love and let that shape us in a way that our daily lives reflect this relationship. It takes longer than outright evangelism, but I've found this is far more authentic and lasting for people who either don't know God or who have understood God negatively. It's why the focus of our ministry at Bethania has been to dive into how we encounter God now and what that might look like in our daily lives and why our ministry can be framed simply as a response to that encounter. I'm curious if this speaks to you personally and I would love to hear your thoughts.

Personal Care & School Supply Kit Items Needed!

We will be collecting items this summer for assembly day of Personal Care Kits and School Supplies for Lutheran World Relief during the annual Day of Service on September 8th.

You can help people dealing with some of life's most difficult situations –the aftermath of earthquakes and floods, fleeing home to escape violence, and living in extreme poverty. When LWR distributes Personal Care Kits, it's often to people who have lost everything. Natural disasters such as earthquakes and refugee camps are typical distribution areas for these kits. Around the world people suffer each day because of lack of basic hygiene. In refugee camps and in the world's poorest communities, a few simple items can mean the difference between sickness and health, and life and death.

Why school supplies? Imagine having to choose between a meal or purchasing a notebook. To the children who receive School Kits, these supplies mean the difference between getting an education or not. Public school is usually free, but in the places where LWR works, even a few required supplies, like pens and paper, may be more than many families can afford. And when parents can only afford to send one of their children to school, girls rarely get priority...yet the education level of mothers has the biggest impact on development.

Here are the items we are collecting. Watch for sales this summer and help us stock up!

Items needed are:

For Personal Care Kits:

1. Bath size towels (light to medium weight, between 20"x40" & 27"x52"), dark colors preferred
2. Bars of soap (4-5 oz., any brand, in original wrapping – 2 per kit)
3. Toothbrush (adult size, in original packaging – bulk buys can be repackaged by us)
4. Comb, sturdy wide toothed
5. Nail clippers (with or without nail files)

For School Supply Kits:

70 sheet College ruled Notebooks (spiral bound)
Pencil sharpeners
#2 Pencils
2-1/2" Erasers

Rulers with centimeters and inches
Blunt tip scissors
Ballpoint (not gel) Pens, Black or Blue ink
Box of Crayons (16 or 24 count)

The printed copies of the directories have arrived and are available in the church office. If you had your picture taken, please come into the office for yours.

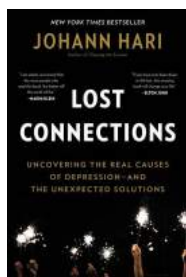
Usher Training: July 7 at 10 am after the 9 am service

As of this writing, (June 28) we will have met or exceeded our offerings budget for the first six months of the year. Thanks be to God!

As we move forward into the remaining summer months and beyond, we do so with the faith and hope that our needs will be met to continue the work that God has set out for us in our congregation, our community, and the world.

Treasurer's Report for May 2019

This report will focus on the cash position of the church, the ordinary income and expenses, and will not include any monies that have been brought into income from other funds. That money has been spent and the expenses are reflected on the balance sheet as improvements to the fixed assets of the church.

Balance Sheet:

The cash balance in the general checking account **at the end of May** was \$557. There is no surplus of funds moving forward into June. The money market fund has \$103,601 in it. Most of this money is designated. All liabilities have been paid and there is no debt.

Profit & Loss - Budget Performance

Other income for the month was up slightly (\$1,100). Offerings for the month were down by \$3,371 from the budget. Offering income has been below budget for four of the first five months of the year. We are currently below the offering budgeted by \$7,969. Overall our income for the first five months was \$10,166 below budget.

Expenses

Our expenses for the month were \$2,200 over budget, and for the first five months we were over budget by \$4,500. Overall we had \$103,622 in income for the first five months and \$128,610 in expenses, or a deficit after five months of \$20,988.

We are now heading into the summer months where, historically, our offerings have been reduced. If we continue in this pattern, we will need to move money from undesignated funds to general operating. At this point we only have approximately \$13,000 in this reserve fund. Last year we used over \$16,000 in reserve funds. I would anticipate that we will be out of funds to move by the end of July or August.
